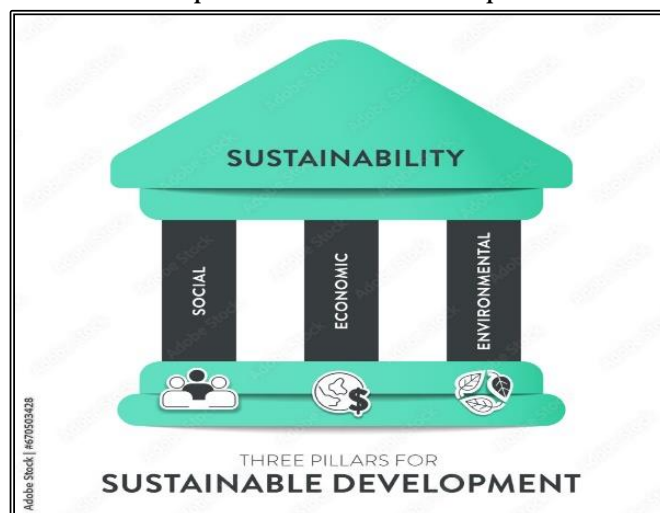
Environmental management also promotes the use of eco-friendly technologies and renewable sources of energy to reduce environmental degradation.
